



More about the 2020 U.S. Census

What Is the 2020 Census?

The 2020 Census counts every person living in the 50 states, District of Columbia, and five U.S. territories (Puerto Rico, American Samoa, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, Guam, and the U.S. Virgin Islands).

The count is mandated by the Constitution and conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, a nonpartisan government agency. Each home will receive an invitation to respond to a short questionnaire—online, by phone, or by mail.

When can I respond to the 2020 Census?

Invitations to respond to the 2020 Census will be delivered between March 12-20. Once you receive that invitation, you can respond online, by phone, or by mail.

Why We Conduct This Count

The census provides critical data that lawmakers, business owners, teachers, and many others use to provide daily services, products, and support for you and your community. It's also in the Constitution: Article 1, Section 2, mandates that the country conduct a count of its population once every 10 years. The 2020 Census will mark the 24th time that the country has counted its population since 1790.

Counting Everyone

Participating in the census is required by law, even if you recently completed another survey from the Census Bureau. A complete and accurate count is critical for you and your community, because the results of the 2020 Census will affect community funding, congres-

It is understandable that anytime a new virus emerges somewhere in the world, it causes concern and invokes a heightened sense of awareness and preparation, and at times fear. What we must remind ourselves of is that we are exposed to viruses and bacteria on a daily basis - influenza and MRSA to name a few. Protecting ourselves through good hygiene and not exposing others when we are sick is what we should already be doing (regardless of a disease outbreak).

I want to share with you what our efforts have been here at Hocking Valley Community Hospital. As a hospital, we are always in a constant state of readiness when it comes to infection control. Our Environmental Services department does an outstanding job ensuring HVCH is cleaned on a daily basis, and they take great pride in their work. They have the supplies needed to properly disinfect an area if we have any type of infection risk. We have taken some additional screening precautions

with regards to the Corona Virus specifically. We are doing a travel screen on every patient based on the current CDC guidance. There are steps in place to place the patient in an area that will allow them to be evaluated and properly treated in a timely manner.

In addition, agencies statewide are working together to ensure we have the latest information as well as resources to help with response efforts if needed. COTS (Central Ohio Trauma System), OHA (Ohio Hospital Association), and ODH (Ohio Department of Health), and EMA (Emergency Management Agency) conduct informational calls on a regular basis. These calls provide updates on the current status of the virus as well as gain a better understanding of what additional resources are needed. The state of Ohio is prepared with caches of personal protective equipment that would be used in the event our state becomes impacted. Our Infection Control nurse and **Emergency** Preparedness Coordinator are directly involved in these planning sessions and distribute information as it pertains to our organization.

In the meantime, the best thing you can do is practice great hand hygiene. Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after going to the bathroom; before eat-

Importance of the Data

The 2020 Census will provide a snapshot of our nation who we are, where we live, and so much more.

The results of this count determine the number of seats each state has in the House of Representatives. They are also used to draw congressional and state legislative districts.

Over the next decade, lawmakers, business owners, and many others will use 2020 Census data to make critical decisions. The results will show where communities need new schools, new clinics, new roads, and more services for families, older adults, and children.

The results will also inform how hundreds of billions of dollars in federal funding are allocated to more than 100 programs, including Medicaid, Head Start, block grants for community mental health services, and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, also known as SNAP.

How the Census Bureau Protects Your Data

The U.S. Census Bureau is bound by law to protect your answers and keep them strictly confidential. In fact, every employee takes an oath to protect your personal information for life.

Under Title 13, the Census Bureau cannot release any identifiable information about you, your home, or your business, even to law enforcement agencies. The law ensures that your private data is protected and that your answers cannot be used against you by any government agency or court.

The answers you provide are used only to produce statistics. You are kept anonymous: The Census Bureau is not permitted to publicly release your responses in any way that could identify you or anyone else in your home.

How Can You Verify That Someone Is a Census Worker?

Census takers will visit homes in April to conduct quality check interviews, and then in mid-May to help collect responses.

If someone visits your home to collect information for the 2020 Census, check to make sure that they have a valid ID badge, with their photograph, a U.S. Department of Commerce watermark, and an expiration date. Census workers may also carry Census Bureau bags and other equipment with the Census Bureau logo. If you still have questions about their identity, you can contact your Regional Census Center to speak with a Census Bureau representative.

Why Are Census Workers Out in Communities?

Census takers play a critical role in the 2020 Census.

In May, they will begin visiting homes that haven't responded to the census to help ensure everyone is counted. These census takers are there to help, and they are legally bound to protect your information. The best way to avoid a visit from a census taker is to fill out the 2020 Census questionnaire online, by phone, or by mail as soon as you receive your invitation to participate.
