• Think today- information is coming in from all directions and we have to make quick changes based on rules coming in from the federal/state government, the Ohio Department of Health, and CMS. Sometimes these rules are completely reversed from the previous day and we must learn to adjust quickly in a chaotic world.

• Get grounded- please take care of yourself physically and mentally because this will not be a short duration. Hospital Finance Update from CFO Julie Grow

During this time, I think it is important to give you a weekly update on what we learn each week about the different funding sources that are starting to surface as a result of the CARES Act. There are many, many, layers to this legislation, but for purposes of this update, I will be focusing mostly on those programs that will provide funding avenues to the hospital and medical group. I highly encourage you to review the CARES Act to see how you personally, could benefit from some of the provisions.

Since the update last week, there has been a flurry of activity while everyone tries to sort through all the details. This information is constantly changing and might be different next week, but here is what we know today:

To begin, the sharp decline in revenue we saw as a result of the Governor's order to cease all elective procedures in an effort to preserve PPE has thankfully leveled off. We now have over two weeks of data to evaluate the effects of ongoing cash flow. Had we not made the changes we did, we would be spending over \$12,500 more per day than we were bringing in. As you know, we have always operated on very slim margins due to our large number of Medicare, Medicaid, and charity care patients. There is no way we could have sustained this for very long. With the changes to staffing, operations, and ordering, we are now running nearly at break even... as long as revenue continues to hold steady. But, we cannot take our eye off the financial wellbeing of the hospital and must explore every avenue possible to ensure we can get as much funding as we can to get us through this.

As for the legislation provisions that continue to be rolled out:

•There has been little to no movement on the section of the CARES Act that earmarks \$117 billion to hospitals and healthcare providers. Currently, the American Hospital Association is lobbying to at least give an initial distribution of \$25,000 per hospital bed to every hospital in the country and then work on the application process for the remaining amount in an effort to provide some immediate relief. This would be an initial cash grant of \$875,000. There is still a lot of work to do and unanswered questions surrounding this portion of the bill.

• Accelerated Payment Program – This is a cash advance from the Medicare program. Basically, they calculate the average amount you receive per month from Medicare and advance 3-6 months of those payments to you in a lump sum. Then after four months, they begin withholding your Medicare payments until the money is paid in full. This would be used as basically an internal line of credit and we would only release funds for use as we get word from each of the other grant programs that money is coming from. This is a LOAN only, but would provide approximately \$5 million of interest free working capital to use while we await the grant distributions.

• Payroll Protection Program – This program is run through the Small Business Association (SBA). You may also hear it referred to as the PPP or P3 loan. While it is structured as a loan, as long as payroll resumes to near pre-disaster levels by the end of June and the loan is used to pay wages, rent, mortgages, and utilities, the loan will be forgiven. The hospital and medical group are applying for approximately \$3.7 million. This does not mean we will be guaranteed this money. The application process starts today and we have submitted the necessary documentation. However, these loans are facilitated through local banks who are existing SBA lenders and there will likely be thousands of loans to be processed at once. The guidance on this program has been very unclear to both the businesses and the lenders and will likely be a hectic process. Not to mention, there is only a finite amount of funds and a lot of small businesses across the country that will be applying for these loans. We very easily could get shut out of funding even though we filed our application on the first day the window opened.

• HCAP Funding – Due to the legislation rolling back the DSH cuts, our HCAP funding will be increased by \$519,000. In total HVCH will receive approximately \$1.2 million in HCAP funds. The Ohio Hospital Association is working with the state to try to move the date of distribution up to as quickly as possible. Typically, we receive these funds in August or September, but the sooner, the better.

• There continues to be discussions at the state level as to how the state can ease the financial burden of the hospitals, including franchise fee delay or forgiveness (\$170,000), increased Medicaid funding, and revising UPL distributions. We continue to monitor these discussions to see how this could impact us. There has been very little information released that would give providers an indication of how much financial support would come from the state level.

One of the other major challenges we have faced is not only availability of, but the rising cost of high demand supplies. Surgical masks that had a pre-epidemic price of pennies per mask are going for anywhere from .50 to \$2 per mask... and that is when we can even get our hands on them. The much sought after N95 masks that are typically around .30 each are going for up to \$5 each... again, when we are able to find distributors with availability. The price for sterilizing and reprocessing the N95s, while generating much needed availability, will cost over \$3 per mask. We've been quoted prices for hand sanitizer for \$100 per gallon! This causes added financial concerns that we must continue to monitor, while providing the much needed PPE to protect our staff and patients.

In closing, I want to leave you with a bit of advice... check on your healthcare friends, because we are not okay. In the past two weeks, I have been in awe at the number of people who have reached out to me, just to ask if I am doing okay. I've heard from colleagues, mentors, friends from grade school, teachers, neighbors, auditors, you name it, and all have in one form or another provided me with support and left me with the message, "We've got this." This is a scary time for all of us, both at the hospital and at home. Yet, we are all in this together. We'll weather this storm and come out stronger than before. HVCH... "We've got this."

donate blood, platelets, or AB Elite plasma. The Red Cross only collects blood from individuals who are healthy and feeling well at the time of donation – and who meet other eligibility requirements.

At each blood drive or donation center, Red Cross employees follow thorough safety protocols, including:

- Wearing gloves and changing them often
- Wiping down donor-touched areas after every collection
- Using sterile collection sets for every donation
- Preparing the arm for donation with aseptic scrub
- Conducting donor mini-physicals to ensure donors are healthy and well on day of donation

Red Cross also has increased vigilance concerning some of these safety protocols including:

- Enhanced disinfecting of surfaces and equipment
- Providing hand sanitizer for use before entering and throughout the donation appointment
- Temperature checks before presenting donors enter the blood drive or donation center
- Following social distancing practices between donors including donor beds, as well as waiting and refreshment areas
- During this time, blankets typically used by platelet, Power Red and AB Elite donors at Red Cross blood donation centers will be laundered after each use, which may limit the availability.
- Staff wearing basic face masks

To ensure staff are healthy each day, Red Cross has implemented standard staff health assessments prior to all blood drives.

Finally, only eligible and healthy people are allowed to give blood.

These mitigation measures will help ensure blood recipient safety, as well as staff and donor safety in reducing contact with those who may potentially have this respiratory infection.

The American Red Cross has implemented new blood donation deferrals out of an abundance of caution. They are asking that individuals postpone their donation for 28 days following:

- Travel to China and its special administrative regions, Hong Kong and Macau, as well as Iran, Italy and South Korea.
- Diagnosis of COVID-19, contact with a person who has the virus, or is suspected to have it.

As the situation evolves, the Red Cross will continue to evaluate all emerging risks in collaboration with the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and industry partners to determine if additional intervention strategies are needed.

Final day of Ohio Primary Election April 28



On March 25, 2020, the Ohio General Assembly passed H.B. 197, a sweeping piece of legislation aimed at dealing with the state's response to the Coronavirus/ COVID-19 pandemic. Among other items, the bill sets April 28, 2020 as the final day of Ohio's primary election.

Request your vote by mail ballot at VoteOhio.gov or by calling your local board of elections.

I VOTED BY MAIL OR IN PERSON BEFORE MARCH 17, 2020, DO I NEED TO VOTE AGAIN?

No, all ballots already submitted by mail or in-person will count, so long as they were otherwise valid. If you voted prior to March 17th your ballot is secured behind double locks at your county board of elections and will be counted on April 28th. Please encourage friends and family who haven't already voted to request a Vote-by-Mail ballot from your local board of elections.

WILL THERE BE IN-PERSON VOTING ON APRIL 28, 2020?

Yes, but since most Ohioans are being advised to stay home right now, the new law only allows for limited inperson voting on April 28th. In-person voting will only occur on April 28 and only at boards of elections early vote centers, not at precinct polling locations. And inperson voting will only be available for individuals with disabilities who require in-person voting and those who do not have a home mailing address.

WHAT IS THE DEADLINE TO REGISTER TO VOTE IN THE 2020 PRIMARY?

The deadline to register for the 2020 primary election was February 18, 2020. Anyone who is eligible to vote, but has not yet registered, can do so for the November 3, 2020 General Election, at VoteOhio.gov(opens in a new window).

WHEN WILL THE RESULTS OF THE ELECTION BE ANNOUNCED?

Tabulation of votes will begin on April 28, 2020 after 7:30 p.m. It's important to note that ballots postmarked by April 27, 2020 will all be counted, so final unofficial results won't be available until May 8, 2020. (This is standard for every election.)
