### Direct to You: From Latricia Johnston

If you recall, my last article was soon after the announcement of the effects of the Coronavirus pandemic. I

mentioned how overnight it seemed our entire world had changed and left all of us full of uncertainty. A volatile economy, concerned healthcare systems across the nation, and panicked individuals grocery hoarding just to name a few.

Roughly a month later, alongside the daily press conferences, searches for personal protective equipment and toilet tissue, other things have risen to the surface.

With the shut down of many businesses, the air has become cleaner from the reduction of carbon emissions produced by motor vehicles, airplanes and factories.

Individuals and families are now taking routine walks and bike rides around towns and parks replacing trips to the gym. Chefs at home have identified new recipes and homemade bread has suddenly become a staple around many dinner tables. Closets, cupboards, garages and other

hidden spaces have now been cleaned that otherwise would have been avoided. Some are taking up gardening for the first time or planting larger gardens as they become less dependent on stores for produce.

The virus has also caused us to step outside of our comfort zones. We are now successfully navigating business meetings through Zoom/Go To meetings better than we might have ever thought we could as individuals. We are downloading books to read from our local libraries as we are sheltering in place. We are receiving our healthcare through the blessings of HVCH telehealth.

And, one of my favorites through this time of social distancing, has been how people have cared for and looked in on one another. Never in my life would I have left a pack of toilet paper or paper towels on my neighbors front door step, until now - and I did. Who would have thought we would put a call out at some point in the history of HVCH for homemade masks, but we did - and you responded. Our local schools are delivering meals to ensure students continue to eat properly. Families and friends are texting/calling to simply check in, shar-

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### **Finance Update**

Slowly, the funding is trickling in. We continue to work to get clarification on much of the guidance that has already been issued, and that is frustrating to say the least. Just last night, Congress passed an additional \$484 billion funding package that included another \$75 billion earmarked for hospitals.

\$100 Billion Grant Fund – We received another disbursement today from the HHS grant fund today. We knew it would be much smaller than the first wave of funding due to the calculation method they were using. We received \$140,000. In total, we've received just over \$800,000. Now, we are waiting to hear if HHS will consider us rural for purposes of the \$10 billion allotted for rural providers that should go out next week.

Payroll Protection Loan – No news on this front. I have been made aware of at least six other public hospitals that were approved for PPP funds, but there has still been no clarification released. I am expecting to see some guidance next week because the Treasury is required to release clarification no later than 30 days after passage – which was March 26th.

**HCAP Distribution** – We did get a bit clearer of a guideline this week on when the funds will be dispersed. This is \$1.2 million and we will likely receive it in late May or early June.

**CAH Grant** – We still haven't heard much about this grant, only that we qualify, that it is for \$90,000, and that the Ohio Dept. of Rural Health has applied for it on our behalf.

**Telehealth Grants** – We believe we have identified the grant we want to pursue and are working to gather the required documentation.

Rural Health Grant – Unfortunately, we were not able to get anywhere with the Ohio Hospital Association to reconsider HVCH as a rural facility. Although the grant was "only" for \$28,000, every dollar counts when it comes to a small RURAL

facility. I was incredibly disappointed in the OHA in their decision.


**BWC Rebate** – According to the Governor's office, 170,000 checks were mailed to businesses this week. We will be on the lookout for our checks – this totals approximately \$87,000.

Accelerated Payment Program – We received an additional Accelerated Payment that we were not expecting due to a processing error at CGS, the Medicare clearinghouse for our region. This takes total APP funds to \$5.2 million and we have secured them in our investment accounts until such a time they are needed.

**FEMA Grant** – We have filled out the initial paperwork for the FEMA funding and are in the process of gathering our qualified expenses. FEMA will reimburse up to 75% of costs associated with Covid-19 response.

Please let me know if you have any questions. I feel it is important that we all keep informed about what is going on at both the state and federal level regarding the financial pressures caused by COVID-19. We are also working on a plan to "open back up" non-emergent procedures. This will ensure patients are getting the care they need, while keeping our staff, providers, and patients safe.
